## "Ready to Create"

Paste paper, gouache, shell gold - "Flag" book with box 3" X 5.5" 3" x 12" extended

This book combines three elements: a quote from painter Paul Freeman, a quote from Emerson and an image of hands on the cover. These elements all refer to human creativity, one passionate ("I leapt out of my mother's womb, screaming for a paintbrush, bellowing for a baton...."), one cerebral and cautionary (The days come and go like muffled and veiled figures....if we do not use the gifts they bring, they a carry them silently away....) The hands are from a sketch of Etruscan handcuffs, used for decorating a deceased person, from one of my travel journals. The flag book form makes a three-=dimensional sculpture of the book, and the two different feelings about creativity are on opposite sides.
