## **Native American Symbols**

Mixed Media, Sumi inks, Bugra paper, collage papers and Dr. Martin's Bleedproof White. The Arrowhead on the cover is from the Cherokee reservation in North Carolina.

Closed book size is 5-1/4" x 5-1/4". Fully opened, it is 20" x 30".

Symbols have been part of the American and the Indian way of life throughout history. Working simple shapes, and what they represent the concept for Star Book became using symbols in a book shaped like a symbol. The pages are made up of one large sheet of paper that has been cut and folded to fit into a square format. If the book is carefully laid out flat, it is all one piece, representing all the tribes belonging to one nation.

## Susan Hensel

Hensel creates literary sculptures that investigate the world of the poet. She makes intimate hand held objects with sensual textures, full of images and words. She challenges her viewers with questions like, "Is there ever a GOOD WAR? Is Love ever enough? What does resurrection mean? Who is watching?"
